

Greetings from the PCC Foundation Board President

As the president of the Pueblo Community College Foundation, I am pleased to offer my support to the foundation that was established in 1981 as a vehicle to financially support the academic advancement of Pueblo Community College. In its 35 year history, the foundation has awarded over \$12 million to PCC to advance the

college and has successfully obtained funding to award over \$4 million in scholarships for students working to obtain associate degrees and certificates.

During the past academic year, PCC awarded 1,286 students associate degrees or certificates, infusing our communities with a highly educated workforce. The foundation awarded 359 scholarships to 216 unique individuals, equaling more than \$350,000 in scholarship awards. Although impressive, many students who applied for PCCF scholarships did not receive the funding necessary to pursue their educational endeavors. Thus, we realize that we need to reach out to even more donors within our community to ensure that we can provide even greater scholarship opportunities in the coming year!

Thanks to recent grant opportunities from the Colorado Department of Higher Education through the Colorado Scholarship Initiative (COSI), the PCC Foundation now has the opportunity to increase the size and number of scholarship awards for the coming year. We have the possibility of offering an additional \$322,000 in scholarships to our students if we can successfully raise half of these dollars in the coming months. We ask for your support NOW during the Season of Giving with the intent of helping us to offer the gift of education to many more PCC students during the coming year.

- The PCC Foundation will soon be awarded \$61,000 in support of our Return to Earn students if we can match those dollars during this Season of Giving. If successful, the foundation will be able to provide \$122,000 in financial assistance to those students who had to suspend their formal education endeavors due to "life happens" circumstances. These students left PCC with debt and cannot return to learn until this debt is resolved. The Return to Earn scholarships are intended to defray the student's past-due debt and offer scholarship funding to help finish their education at PCC.
- In addition to the Return to Earn grants, PCC has been offered the opportunity to provide an additional \$104,000 in scholarships for production technician certificates and \$96,000 in Commercial Driver License certificates if donors will agree to match those COSI grant awards (\$52,000 and \$48,000, respectively).

The PCC Foundation Board of Directors and staff are collaborating in a joint effort to raise the dollars needed to match these valuable grant opportunities. Whatever you can spare, you can be a part of changing the lives of many of our students who are committed to achieving educational success.

On behalf of the PCC Foundation board of directors and staff and those 5,500 students who are enrolled on the PCC campuses in Pueblo, Cañon City, Durango and Mancos/Cortez, we thank you for your support. We hope you will consider joining with us NOW and help in offering a life-changing gift to our PCC students this year. Together, we can make the difference in the lives of those students and the overall well-being of our southern Colorado communities.





PCC Approved for Dental Hygiene Bachelor's Degree Program

On May 17, the Higher Learning Commission approved PCC's application to offer its first bachelor's degree — a Bachelor of Applied Science completion degree in Dental Hygiene. The historic program started Fall 2016 and already has generated strong interest from working hygienists who want to expand their career options in teaching, research and other education-related areas.




Spring Job Fair Attracts Huge Crowd

PCC Named Public Health Champion


PCC was named the 2016 Public Health Champion by the Pueblo City-County Health Department. The award goes to an individual or agency displaying significant contributions to Pueblo's public health as a role model for the community. PCC was cited for its food safety and healthy eating options; commitment to improving childcare systems and policies through the Children First program; involvement in tobacco education and efforts to have tobacco-free campuses; and opening its recreation center to the community to promote better health.




Astronaut Provided PCC's Commencement Address

Dr. Ronald Sega was the keynote speaker for PCC's 2016 graduation ceremonies. Sega is a retired NASA astronaut who flew missions on space shuttles Discovery and Atlantis. He also served as NASA's director of operations in Russia, helping to train cosmonauts and astronauts for flights to the International Space Station. He currently teaches systems engineering at CSU in Fort Collins.

A total of 953 students received degrees and certificates from PCC on May 13 and 15. There were 806 graduates at the Pueblo/Fremont ceremony and 147 from SCCC East (Durango) and West (Mancos).





Gateway Receives National Award

In July, our Gateway to College program was presented with the 2016 Gateway Graduation Achievement Award for exceeding the network's graduation benchmark in 2014-15. The honor was presented at the GTC National Network Peer Learning Conference. PCC partners with eight school districts to offer GTC at its Pueblo, Fremont and SCCC-East campuses. In addition, GTC National Network President Emily Froimson visited Pueblo to take part in PCC's Pre-college graduation on May 23.

Culinary Program Earns State Honor

PCC's Culinary Arts program received the American Chef Federation's Colorado Chef Association Excellence in Education award on February 22.

The honor goes to Culinary Arts programs that have participated in competitions, attended ACF sponsored educational events, and made significant progress toward improving and innovating their programs.

ack in 1933, classes at then-Southern Colorado Junior College cost \$12, and it's first graduating class in 1935 consisted of 17 proud students.

83 years later, what is now Pueblo Community College is still what Frank S. Hoag, Jr. sought and achieved for the citizens of Pueblo in 1933 – an affordable, high-quality educational institution. In fact, the Brookings Institute recently ranked PCC fourth in the nation among two- and four-year colleges in providing students with a valuable education.

In the annals of the school's history, Hoag is recognized as "the Founding Father of PCC."

Community members, sponsors, and PCC staff and students gathered on a brisk afternoon Dec. 16, 2015, as a commemorative statue of Hoag on the Pueblo campus was unveiled in what is now known as Hoag Plaza.

PCC President Dr. Patty Erjavec said the sculpture, created by artist Sutton Betti, will be a symbol for the dedication and perseverance of students and the commitment to fulfill PCC's decades-long mission to provide the best quality education possible.

The Hoag statue project was a collaborative effort between the Robert Hoag Rawlings Foundation (Bob Rawlings), the LeVert W. Hoag Foundation (Bob Wertz, Dave Shaw, and Jim Munch), and the PCC Foundation (Joe Welte).

Walt Schepp's generosity helps transport students on school trips



Panther Student Pantries now serve all PCC campuses

What happens when varying groups team up to accomplish a project? Everyone wins! Or in this case, over 13,000 students (and counting) are winning as they are provided with items they need to stay focused on school.

PCC's Associated Student Government, seeing students in need of basic items such as rice, peanut butter and even toilet paper, approached the PCC Foundation and Care and Share Food Bank for Southern Colorado in 2013 to create a student food pantry on the Pueblo campus. ASG committed to staff the pantry and fund the food purchased from Care and Share. In turn, Care and Share provides food at very low cost (often just 19 cents a pound). The Foundation helps coordinate corporate food drives, acquire grants, and collect donations to purchase items not available through Care and Share (such as toiletries and a variety of food staples).

The first Panther Student Pantry opened on the Pueblo campus in February 2014, and usage rose quickly to roughly 150 student visitors per week. Students may visit once a week, and may select six unique food items and one personal hygiene item.

The project has since expanded to include all four PCC campuses, serving 12,820 students as of October 1, 2016. Students are able to leave with about 15 pounds of food each week, which really helps stretch their food budget.

Your generous donations allow us to buy items that are in high demand but not available through Care and Share, such as toilet paper, deodorant, toothpaste, and canned fruit. Thank you for helping our students focus on their studies, instead of an empty stomach.
